Virtual Commencement for the Class of 2020

Circumstances certainly scuttled the pomp... the "Pomp and the Circumstance". Seats in the PPL Center remained vacant. The coronavirus had sabotaged the traditions of a normal commencement exercise.



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Creatively, the Principal and staff of Louis E. Dieruff High School were forced to develop alternatives to celebrate the graduation of the Class of 2020.

The solution was to implement the magic of modern technology and produce a virtual commencement.

During the few weeks preceding the presentation, Dieruff Principal Michael Makhoul, his staff, and selected graduating students worked with an accomplished professional video production company to compose a most entertaining program.

Speakers were auditioned, selected, rehearsed, and video taped. Cathy Schulte Piston, Dieruff 1985 graduate, Kiska Award Winner, Teacher and Coach at Dieruff since 1989, was chosen for the Honored Dieruff Alumni Award. Photo clips of seniors' activities were set to music by the Video Club, and arranged as visual segues throughout the program.



Special slides were produced to feature each of the 72 Honor Graduates who had achieved a GPA higher than 3.5 (out of a 4.0 scale). Each slide contained a photo of the graduate, in cap and gown, as well as Class Rank, GPA, Post Secondary Plans, and School Activities. The Valedictorian of the Class is Angie Rabih, ranked 1st in the class with a *GPA of 5.237*. She is headed for Princeton. FLASHBACK: Kiska Award Recipients Mark Connections

Often regarded as Dieruff's most coveted prize, The Kiska Award is presented to a senior or seniors who exemplify athletic ability, scholarship, citizenship, leadership and loyalty. That translates into the ultimate blend of a well-rounded student.

Since 1960, The Kiska Award has been earned by 112 people. It is only natural that many "Husky Connections" exist.




The 2020 female recipient of the Kiska Award is Deona Davis. A passionate leader, Deona served as a Captain in the AFJROTC Program. She also was captain of the Girls Basketball Team and the Track and Field Team.

One fascinating "Husky Connection" is that Deona's basketball coach was Cathy Schulte Piston, a 1985 Dieruff Alumna and Kiska Award recipient. This year, Cathy was selected as the Honored Distinguished Alumni and keynote speaker at the 2020 virtual commencement.

As a gifted Track star, Deona owns <u>seven</u> school records, and is headed for Tiffin University in Ohio, having received a track scholarship. Her success in Track and Field is certainly reminiscent of 1979 Alum and Kiska Award recipient, Vivian Riddick. During her '76-'79 stint at Dieruff, Vivian competed as a long jumper and sprinter, and was the first Husky to log 100 First Place Wins. She went on to Penn State, serving as team captain and earning All American status.

Karam Chakif is this year's male Kiska Award winner. He proudly served as President of the Class of 2020, and graduated 4th in his class, with a GPA of 4.703 on a 4.0 scale. Karam played football all four years, and was team captain during his junior and senior years. He began wrestling his sophomore year, and was team captain all three years. He distinguished himself his senior year by winning the 285 pound championship titles at both the District XI and Northeast Regional Tournaments. Karam will be attending Lehigh University in the Fall.

A most memorable Kiska Award winner whose academic and athletic career parallels that of Karim Chakif is Jon Rushatz, Class of 1963. Jon was an outstanding student, President of the Student Council, and a remarkable football player and wrestler. His senior year, Jon won District XI and Regional championships, and placed second at States. He continued at Lehigh University, where he played running back in football, and boasted a sensational record in wrestling. As a sophomore, he won a third place medal at the National Tournament.



And so, we salute <u>all</u> of our Kiska Award winners, totally confident that they will continue to bring honor to themselves, and also to Dieruff High School.

Our first 2020 Wall of Distinction honoree, Dr. Lori Chapleskie Alphonse, hails from the LED Class of 1984. As a Penn State alumna with a work ethic from her blue-collar roots, she later was inspired to attend medical school to become a cancer surgeon.


She admirably returned to her studies to pursue a degree from the Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine from which she graduated with honors. Following her internship and residency at Mercy Suburban Hospital in Norristown, Pennsylvania, Dr. Alphonse returned to the Lehigh Valley to serve the community in which she was raised.

Today, she is the Deputy Physician-in-Chief of Surgical Oncology at the LV Cancer Institute and is the Medical Director of Breast Health Services for Lehigh Valley Health Network. She also chairs the General Surgery Residency Mentorship Program.


