# Alumni Wall of Distinction Recipient Succumbs to Cancer

We certainly have lost a great one. Tim Keller, Dieruff Class of 1968, was inducted into our Alumni Wall of Distinction in 2019, a member of our inaugural class. Recognized as an internationally known pastor and accomplished author, Tim established a most remarkable reputation for himself. The following is his most impressive obituary that appeared in the New York Times.

Shunning fire and brimstone, he became a best-selling author and founded Redeemer Presbyterian Church, which drew young New Yorkers.

The Rev. Timothy J. Keller, a best-selling author and theorist of Christianity who performed a modern miracle of his own — establishing a theologically orthodox church in Manhattan that attracted thousands of young professional followers — died on Friday at his home in Manhattan. He was 72.

His death was announced by Redeemer City to City, an organization affiliated with Redeemer Presbyterian Church. Mr. Keller announced on Twitter in December 2021 that he had Stage 4 pancreatic cancer.

Mr. Keller, whose only previous experience in the pulpit had been at a blue-collar congregation in a rural Virginia parish, moved with his wife and three sons to New York in 1989 and, with neither fire nor brimstone, embarked on what New York magazine hyperbolized as "close to a theological suicide mission — to create a strictly conservative Christian church in the heart of Sodom."

By the end of 2007, Mr. Keller wrote in his best-selling 2008 book, his church "had grown to more than 5,000 attendees and had spawned more than a dozen daughter congregations in the immediate metropolitan area."

Colleagues, Mr. Keller recalled in his best-selling book "The Reason for God: Belief in an Age of Skepticism" (2008), "were incredulous when I explained that the beliefs of the new church would be the orthodox, historic tenets of Christianity — the infallibility of the Bible, the deity of Christ, the necessity of spiritual regeneration (the new birth)— all doctrines considered hopelessly dated by the majority of New Yorkers. Nobody ever said 'fuggedaboutit' out loud, but it always hung in the air.

"Nevertheless," he continued, "we launched Redeemer Presbyterian Church, and by the end of 2007 it had grown to more than 5,000 attendees and had spawned more than a dozen daughter congregations in the immediate metropolitan area."

Today the church has several locations in Manhattan, though the main one is on West 83rd Street near Amsterdam Avenue; the others are on the Lower West Side, on the West Side at Lincoln Square, on the Upper East Side and in East Harlem.

In addition to those who heard him preach in person at any one of those churches, thousands downloaded Mr. Keller's weekly sermons from the Redeemer website. His dozens of books have been translated into 25 languages and sold an estimated 25 million copies.

"Fifty years from now," the journal Christianity Today wrote in 2006, "if evangelical Christians are widely known for their love of cities, their commitment to mercy and justice, and their love of their neighbors, Tim Keller will be remembered as a pioneer of the new urban Christians."

Evangelicals belong to any number of denominations but share a theology of salvation through faith in Christ alone. Mr. Keller's ministry was unlike that of many better-known figures in evangelicalism: He lacked a regular television platform and avoided being identified with a single political view.

Instead, he delivered pointed, professorial messages — in person, on podcasts, on blogs and in print — in conversational tones that invoked C.S. Lewis, the philosophers Michel Foucault and Thomas Kuhn, the 18th-century Japanese poet Issa, and even Woody Allen.

He considered homosexuality to be inconsistent with scripture and premarital sex and abortion to be sins. "I am not going to pressure you to stop having sex out of marriage," he told The New York Times in 1998. "The logic of your relationship with Christ should move you to do it."

In an interview with The Atlantic in 2019, he said: "What we need is a non-oppressive moral absolute. We need moral absolutes that don't turn the bearers of those moral absolutes into oppressors themselves."

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In 2017, Mr. Keller gave up his role as senior pastor of Redeemer Presbyterian Church and shifted to mentoring pastors to preside in churches seeded around the world by the offshoot organization Redeemer City to City, which influences urban ministries globally.

Redeemer Presbyterian Church also founded Hope for New York, an organization that deploys volunteers and distributes grants to ministries providing social services, and the Center for Faith and Work, which integrates Christian theology with professional experience.

Mr. Keller dissented from the widespread support that largely white evangelical Americans have shown for former President Donald J. Trump and his Republican allies. "For Christians just to completely hook up with one party or another is really idolatry," he told The Atlantic.

And he frequently drew — and tried to bridge — a distinction between that politically conservative American evangelicalism and the evangelical movement worldwide.

"There exists a far larger evangelicalism, both here and around the world, which is not politically aligned," Mr. Keller wrote in The New Yorker in 2017, describing it as a growing multiethnic movement rooted in theological beliefs that are conservative on issues like sex outside marriage and liberal on issues like racial justice and concern for the poor.

His death elicited a statement from former President George W. Bush, a fellow evangelical Christian, who said: "I'm fortunate to have gotten to know him. And I'm one of many who is blessed to have learned from Mr. Keller's teachings and benefited from his compassion."

They met during World War II, when William Keller was a conscientious objector assigned to care for patients in a mental ward.

Tim was raised Lutheran and embraced the church through the InterVarsity Christian Fellowship, a ministry active on college campuses, while he was attending Bucknell University in Pennsylvania, where he majored in religion.

He defined a fully formed Christian as "somebody who finds Christianity both rationally and intellectually credible, but also emotionally and existentially true and satisfying."

After he graduated with a bachelor's degree in 1972, he received a master's of divinity from Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary in Massachusetts in 1975 and a doctor of ministry degree from Westminster Theological Seminary in Pennsylvania in 1981. It was at Westminster that he met Kathy Louise Kristy, who decided against becoming a pastor because female ministers were not biblical. They married in 1975.

She survives him, along with three sons, David, Michael and Jonathan; a sister, Sharon Johnson; and seven grandchildren. Michael Keller is a pastor at Redeemer Lincoln Square.

Mr. Keller served with InterVarsity Christian Fellowship in Boston and was ordained there before serving as pastor for nine years in Hopewell, Va., while overseeing the development of new congregations in the Mid-Atlantic region for the Presbyterian Church.

When New York seemed so daunting that Mr. Keller's first two choices for pastor there turned him down, he felt compelled to accept the challenge himself.

"I just felt it would be cowardly of me not to," he told New York magazine. "But we had a kind of 'sick in the pit of our stomach' feeling every day."

"Big bad Whore of Babylon is where we were going," Mrs. Keller told the magazine.

The family moved to an apartment on Roosevelt Island.

His success as founding pastor of Redeemer in 1989 and his experience with a bout of thyroid cancer in 2002 helped eliminate whatever doubts he had about God, he told the website First Things in 2008.

He reaffirmed that faith in his 2021 Twitter post announcing his cancer diagnosis, writing: "It is endlessly comforting to have a God who is both infinitely more wise and more loving than I am. He has plenty of good reasons for everything he does and allows that I cannot know, and therein is my hope and strength."

Mr. Keller encapsulated Redeemer's mission in one biblical passage, Proverbs, Chapter II, Verse 10: "When the right-eous prosper, the city rejoices."

He told The Times, "I wanted to prove that the Gospel could change people even in New York."



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
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
