Operation Recognition

Once again, The Dieruff High School Alumni Association is seeking military veterans who attended Dieruff High School during the Vietnam War, but did not graduate due to entry into the military service.

"Operation Recognition", established by the Pennsylvania State Legislature, authorizes school districts to grant a high school diploma to any eligible veteran who served during World War II, the Korean Conflict, or the Vietnam War.

We are pleased to announce that Louis E. Dieruff High School is proud to participate in this program and we are anxious to locate, recognize, and honor those veterans who meet the following requirements:

Was honorably discharged from the Armed Forces of the United States.

Served in the U.S. military between February 28, 1961 and May 7, 1975.

Attended Dieruff High School between 1959 and 1975 during the Vietnam War.

Would have been a member of a graduating Class from 1960 through 1975 and did not graduate due to entry into military service.

Also, please note that upon proper application, a diploma shall be awarded posthumously to a veteran who meets the stated requirements.

The inaugural recipients were presented posthumously at the Graduation Ceremony for the Class of 2016 to Dennis Wayne Burian, USMC (Class of 1968) and Richard Michael Seng, USMC (Class of 1967). Both were killed in action during the Vietnam War in 1968.

Sharon Burian Antrim '66 accepted the diploma on behalf of her brother and Mrs. Mary Seng, 96-year-old mother accepted the diploma on behalf of her son. The diplomas were presented by a USMC serviceman and bouquets of flowers were presented by two AFJROTC cadets.

Please let's keep up this tradition. Ann Blacker, Class of 1984 once again will be the chairperson for the important project. If you know of any veteran who should be honored, please complete the application and either drop off or mail to the following address.

Memories of a Perfect Season – Dieruff Cross Country 1966

The history of sports at Dieruff High School is filled with tales of outstanding athletes and teams. I had the privilege of running on the Dieruff cross country teams that were District 11 champions in 1965 and 1966. The 1966 team was not only the District champion but also had an undefeated 11-0 dual meet record. This is a story about these teams and my wonderful memories of these seasons.

My path to the Dieruff cross country team was unconventional. In the 1960s, there were many athletic opportunities for boys at the four Allentown junior high schools. I joined the South Mountain track team in seventh grade. I enjoyed running, but I also played football and wrestled. I ran the 880- yard run in eighth and ninth grades, winning the junior high championship in the event in the spring of 1964.



In the fall of 1964, I joined a group of South Mountain students who were assigned to Dieruff, rather than Allen, due to a realignment of school district boundaries. I tried out for and made a very good Dieruff junior varsity football team and started as a guard on the offensive line and linebacker on defense. At the end of the football season, I had an epiphany. I wanted to participate in a sport in college, and it became clear to me that a 135-pound distance runner was not going to play college football.

I had a neighborhood friend who attended Perkiomen School and ran cross country. He talked about his experiences, and my interest in the sport was piqued. In the spring of 1965, I ran track for Dieruff and met Danny O'Donnell, Dave Azar and Ken Schimeneck, all members of the 1964 Dieruff cross country team. My friendship with these runners cemented the idea that I should give cross country a try.

I spent the summer of 1965 training, running up and down Honeysuckle Road on South Mountain, and joined the 1965 Dieruff cross country team, coached by the legendary Richard "Dick" Schmidt. Cross country was a much different sport in 1965 than it is today. There was no team for girls, Title IX was not enacted until 1972. Several schools in the Lehigh Valley did not even have a team; including Bethlehem, Easton, Central Catholic, Whitehall, and Northampton; though individuals could participate at districts. Competition involved a series of dual meets, rather than the large multi-team races that are conducted today.

Dieruff's home course was a lovely 2.3 mile run in Allentown, starting at a location just off Lehigh Parkway North, continuing on the bridle path to the old "iron bridge," and finishing near Lehigh Parkway North on the opposite side of the Little Lehigh Creek from the race start. A winning time on this route was usually slightly over 13 minutes.

My teammates were all memorable. Danny O'Donnell had a big personality and always had a smile on his face. He was a gifted athlete and had a natural talent for distance running. In any race with Danny, the first half mile or so was a sprint. He had both speed and endurance, so it was necessary for a competitor to try to keep up with him from the beginning of a race. He was also a "chatty" runner, telling nonstop stories and jokes during our daily training runs to Bethlehem or up the Jerome Street hill.

Two holdovers from the 1964 team were Ken Schimeneck, a senior who was always nervous before a race but a consistently solid contributor, and Dave Azar, a senior who was a steady top ten performer. Rounding out our top six was Bruce Long, who was in my class and also from South Mountain, and Kevin Thompson, a promising sophomore.

The 1965 team had its ups and downs during the dual meet season. Danny and I finished first and second, respectively, in the first few meets, but we lost several close team races because of the depth of the talent in our competition. I won a race late in the season, outkicking Danny at the end of the race in a personal best time of 13 minutes and 11 seconds on our Lehigh Parkway course.

Because of our lackluster record, Dieruff was not favored to win the end-of-the-season District 11 championship meet at Southern Lehigh. But we won!

I had a near-perfect race at districts. I was leading the pack in the last mile, smelling victory, only to be passed in the last few yards by a Bethlehem runner. Danny finished fourth, Dave Azar eighth, Ken Schimeneck eleventh, and Kevin Thompson twelfth, leading *The Morning Call* to report:

"Dieruff wasn't overly impressive as a team during the cross country dual meet season. Bethlehem didn't even compete on an interscholastic basis. But the Huskies and the Hurricanes were the surprises of the District 11 meet yesterday at Southern Lehigh. Dieruff placed it two best runners in the top five and romped to the Class A team championship..."


The 1966 team surpassed the accomplishments of the 1965 team by completing a perfect 11-0 dual meet record and winning our second straight District 11 championship. Dave Azar and Ken Schimeneck had graduated, but Kevin Thompson, Bruce Long, and newcomers Charlie Jones and Scott Gross developed into solid team contributors.

Even with the perfect dual meet record, the District 11 race presented a challenge for our team. The dual meet with Parkland earlier in the season was close, and Parkland had two very strong runners, as well as good depth. We met the challenge, and in the fall of 1966, the Dieruff cross country team capped a perfect season by winning its second straight District 11 championship. *The Morning Call* reported:

"....Dieruff Team Champ – Jim Ott of Parkland and Danny O'Donnell of Dieruff finished 1-2 in record time in the District 11 Class A cross country championship yesterday, but it was a 15th place finish by Charlie Jones that gave Dick Schmidt's Huskies their second straight title. Jones finished four places in front of Parkland's Dale Stahley and that was the margin of victory as Dieruff gained a 41-45 decision over the Trojans...." (note: cross country scoring is unusual in that the lower score wins)

I went on to earn varsity letters in cross country and track at Lafayette College. With the intense training involved with a Division I program, I got much faster. I had many memorable races at Lafayette, but I believe the best was as a sophomore. Lafayette ran a dual meet with a very strong Princeton University team in the fall of 1968. We lost the meet, but I finished in the top ten and far ahead of a Princeton runner from Bethlehem who was the very runner who had just edged me out of a victory three years earlier in the 1965 District 11 championship race.

After graduating from Lafayette, I went on to law school at Villanova. I returned to the Lehigh Valley after law school, and I have been practicing law for the last 45 years. I have continued to run, not as fast as in the "glory days," but even after 58 years of running, I can still lace up the running shoes and cover five to six miles.
