The stars were certainly in alignment during the last eight years. Mrs. Susan Bocian was selected to serve as the Principal of Louis E. Dieruff High School nine years ago. Our Alumni Association was founded eight years ago. To say that we enjoyed a "healthy partnership" would be an understatement, indeed!

It seemed like we have been in sync every step of the way. Each proposal we presented to her was greeted with a "thumbs up". Every idea we discussed transitioned into reality.

Some of the ideas were simple, and required relatively little effort or consideration. For example, we were able to launch the "Sew What?" Club, that after school sewing club with ease. And gaining approval for members of the Alumni Association to participate in school pep rallies and Commencement was a snap. Even projects like decorating the main lobby with photo collages of the Theatre Department performances, or adorning the Meilinger Media Center with alumni photos and collages, gained rapid and enthusiastic acceptance.

Several of the major projects took some work... and required some teamwork... and playing "politics". But the rewards were great. In 2014, we were able to raise \$10,000 to send the Dieruff Band and AFJROTC Cadets to Canton, OH to march in NFL Hall of Fame Enshrinement Parade for Dieruff Alum Andre Reed. And then, one year later we worked with Mrs. Bocian to gain City Council approval to rename Washington Street adjacent to the school "Andre Reed Way" and Irving Park " Andre Reed Park". Naming the field at J. Birney Crum Stadium in honor of Andre Reed was a bit more of a "challenge", dealing with the School Board. But we got it done! Once again, thank you Sue Bocian.

Another significant initiative was naming the school auditorium in honor of Mr. Peter Carpenter. The dedication ceremony was so very emotional and memorable for all of us.



With the pending retirement of Mrs. Bocian on the horizon, we knew that we wanted to gain her approval to begin the "Alumni Wall of Distinction" project. As we presented our proposal for this project, we were thrilled to learn that no additional approval was required from "up town", and that Mrs. Bocian was able to endorse the project quickly and with enthusiasm. The inaugural induction ceremony of the six alumni to the Wall occurred on June 20th.

At the conclusion of the Alumni Wall of Distinction ceremony, we surprised Mrs. Bocian with a special tribute and a gift from the Alumni Association. The truth is that no gift, nor words of praise, can thank her enough for helping our association gain the traction and develop as it has during these last eight years. She has truly served as our "Champion" and our faithful friend. We wish her abundant joy in her retirement.

Profile Special: Susan Bocian, Going Full Circle

Outgoing Dieruff High School Principal Susan Bocian is the following: A teacher, mentor, administrator, wife (to Blaze), mother (to Zach and Veronica), grandmother (to Layla and soon-to-be born Blaze), gardener, cook, bowler, a hellava card player and, a survivor. She was born to be a Husky...literally.

"When Henry Widner was named as the new high school's first Principal, he arrived a year before to take on all the additional planning needed before the school opened in September of 1959," Susan begins. "Mr. Widner had a secretary that he brought to the new school with him, Mrs. Doris Haffner, who sat in all the meetings with contractors, sales reps and prospective employees. She worked with Mr. Widner to get Dieruff High School ready to open." In 1960, Mrs. Haffner became pregnant, and as was the custom of the day, left Dieruff until after her child was born. In 1961, Tom and Doris Haffner welcomed Susan into the world. That little baby would grow up to one day become Principal of Louis E. Dieruff High School herself. Going full circle from the womb to retirement at Dieruff High School.

Susan Haffner grew up not too far from the East Side, in Catasauqua - Small Town U.S.A. "A lot of hard working people, not too different from the families on the South Side and East Side," Susan tells us. She was an honor student, "I loved, loved school! I was a reader and my parents would beg me to go outside and play. I was such a nerd for learning."

She had come from a family involved in education. "I was going to be a teacher. Teaching was very familiar to me. My father was a teacher, my mother worked in schools, my sister was a teacher, and my greatgrandmother worked in a one-room schoolhouse in Hellertown. Education of women in my family has always been a priority."

After graduating from Catasauqua High School in 1979, when choosing

colleges, she first thought that she would attend Indiana University of Pennsylvania (IUP), even having already enrolled there. But her mother suggested that she visit Penn State before she made her final decision.

"I got there and right away I thought, *This is it, I'm coming here*," and with that Susan decided on Penn State. "It was great, I got to meet all these people from all over the country and to experience different things. I took downhill skiing and they would bus us to the mountains. I bowled, and the school had their own (bowling) lanes. Besides, they had great football teams coached by Joe Paterno. And of course, that's where I met my husband Blaze."

After graduating from Penn State, Susan found it difficult to find a job teaching immediately, so she went to work at a bank. Susan explains, "I would work in the summer at 1st National Bank as a relief teller, mostly for the regular tellers who went on vacation, but when I needed a job, they hired me full time to work at the 7th and Hamilton location".

In the winter of 1984, Susan was offered a job as a teacher at Northern Lehigh for the Spring Semester. At only 22 years old, she was teaching students who were only 4 or 5 years younger than she was.

After her review at the end of the semester, which she was given glowing remarks by Northern Lehigh's principal, she was offered a job to return as a substitute. She also was offered a position she thought was at South Mountain Junior High, which she accepted, only later to find out it was a school she wasn't familiar at all with... Harrison-Morton, by then turning into a middle school.

It became a school and a job she loved, "I taught English there for 13 years. Middle school kids are the best. They are so funny, though they don't mean to be. They're awkward, yet they are becoming adults. They

were so much fun to be around. I really enjoyed my time there."



But how did she finally come to Dieruff? Susan tells us, "I decided that I wanted to do something different in teaching. I came to Dieruff one day and spoke with Mr. Meilinger. He was so sweet to me. I told him that I would like to teach at Dieruff, and he made it happen. He just reassigned me."


It took Susan a couple of years at Dieruff to get established, "I didn't even have my own classroom. It was a big victory when I finally got one." But once she did become an established teacher, Susan (who was far junior to most of the other English teachers) was given an honor which would lead her to her final objective she was made the English Department Chair. "I loved the chair position and I was successful at it."

Susan realized that leadership was important to her and she could go back to school to get her certification. It took 2 ½ years and "a lot of trips on the turnpike and a family to still take care of", but Susan finally got her certificate. She knew that if she was going to be an administrator, she had to once again leave her comfort zone and take an Assistant Principal's position at William Allen High School. "I had received offers at both Dieruff and Allen, but I knew it would be good for me. I was too comfortable at Dieruff. If I wanted to be an Assistant Principal and I was going to be one of the bosses, then I needed to make that break. I had to be the boss somewhere else. It was an enormously challenging time. It was so big!" But when the opportunity opened as the Academic Assistant Principal at Dieruff, Susan came home, or as she said, "got to get back to the family."

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Dieruff High School Celebrates Alumni Wall of Distinction

For the Huskies, it was a "family affair". Many of the distinguished alumni honored at the inaugural induction ceremony of the Alumni Wall of Distinction were accompanied by a large contingent of proud family members, some traveling in from California and Canada.

Scheduled to coincide with the 60th Anniversary of Dieruff High School, the ceremony was held in the auditorium on June 20, 2019. Appropriately, the program opened with the National Anthem, sung a cappella by Miss Milaijah Torres, newly graduated and recipient of a coveted Freddy Award for her performance in "Once on this Island". Mr. Peter Carpenter, composer of the Dieruff Alma Mater, and the "living legend" for whom the auditorium is named, then sat at the baby grand and led the audience in the Alma Mater.

The expressed purpose of the Alumni Wall of Distinction is to recognize

alumni for their exceptional accomplishments, and also to promote Husky Pride among current students by displaying the accomplishments of those who grew up in their neighborhoods and walked those same hallways.

For the initial class, six alumni were chosen by a selection committee from a large pool of nominees. Those selected included a celebrated jazz musician, a county sheriff, a well-known pastor, an accomplished college professor, a brilliant physicist who passed away at the age of 31, and a highly respected physician.

The honored alumni were:

Rick Braun, Class of 1973, is an internationally known jazz trumpeter, vocalist, song writer, and record producer. Living in California, Rick is often on tour, and when he performs in the Lehigh Valley, he makes it a point to play the Dieruff Fight Song.

Joseph Hanna, Class of 1974, has spent his career in law enforcement. He rose through the ranks in Allentown, PA from patrolman to Chief of Police. Then after serving as a Detective with the Lehigh County, Joe was elected Sheriff of the County.

Timothy "Tim" Keller, Class of 1968, is a highly recognized minister and author. He is the founding pastor of the Redeemer Presbyterian Church in New York City, a church that typically enjoys weekly attendance of over

5,000. Tim has also written three New York Times bestselling books, and has also authored almost thirty books on religion.

Pamela Kistler, Ph.D., Class of 1971, is a chemistry professor at Cedar Crest College, where she has served as Chair of the Department of Chemical & Physical Science. She is also Councilor of the American Chemical Society.

Kirk Shinsky, Ph.D., Class of 1970, was a brilliant physicist who launched his career when he was a senior in high school. He won a national science competition, and was selected as the Nation's #1 Scientist. He earned a full scholarship to Cornell, received his Masters and Doctorate degrees at Princeton, and then became a professor of Physics at the University of California at Berkeley.

John Stevens, Jr. D.O., Class of 1963, is an extremely popular physician, specializing in Obstetrics/ Gynecology. He is Chair, Ob/Gyn at St. Lukes's Hospital and is a Associate Clinical Professor at DeSales University.

The well-attended program concluded with an emotional tribute to Mrs. Susan Bocian, who is retiring after 35 years in the Allentown School District, serving the last nine years a Principal at Dieruff High School. She has been a faithful friend and "champion" of the Louis E. Dieruff Alumni Association.

The profile printed in the Commencement Program Booklet is impressive, indeed! It reads, "Kay has always prided herself as being a product of the 'First Ward' and the Allentown School District. Growing up near the corner of Linden Street and Ridge Avenue, Kay attended Sheridan Elementary and Harrison Morton Junior High School before graduating from Dieruff High in 1974.



Kay chose to enter the work force after graduation and has made a lifelong career (42 years as of last month) at People First Federal Credit Union. She started as a teller and has worked her way up through the organization and currently holds the position of Business Development & Community Relations Manager since 1993.

Kay took advantage of her company's tuition reimbursement program and after 10 years of taking evening courses at LCCC, she earned her Associate's Degree in Business Administration.

In her position, Kay has given back to our local community and has participated on committees and served on boards of many local organizations including Meals on Wheels of Lehigh County, KidsPeace, Mayfair Festival of the Arts and the ASD Foundation.

Kay's proudest accomplishment has come from her work and dedication to the Dieruff High School Alumni Association. Kay currently serves as Vice President and Website Administrator."

In 2011, a new group of strangers came into Susan's life. Susan explains, "I met Fred Schuler and he said that he was planning to start an Alumni Association at Dieruff. I thought that it was a fantastic idea. Fred really wanted to be the catalyst to get the alumni association going."

Susan is proud of what the Alumni Association has done for the students of Dieruff, "The Alumni supports the kids. The members have become extended surrogate grandparents. They come out, cheer at games for them, go to their concerts and shows or give them a reception after an event. It's important to the students to know that when their family can't be

there, their extended family will be. The Alumni Association is a wonderful support network for the students."


One person Susan wanted to mention who has changed the Dieruff students directly is Alumni President John Hughes. "The magic you can create with a camera. The pictures he takes forms Dieruff into a family. A family displays pictures around the home of everyone in the family. Through the photographs, by printing hard copies, the photos can be passed down through the generations. So by John doing that, the photos become part of the culture. I had to buy more frames for all the displays. Dieruff finally has its own family photo album."

Susan's a fighter in more ways than one...she uses Rocky as an inspiration, "When I taught my first class at Northern Lehigh, I would sit in the car and cry. I didn't think I could do it. But like Rocky in the first movie, I was going the distance, no matter how bad I thought it was...and I got a glowing review." In 2014, Susan was diagnosed with cancer and had to take a

leave of absence for her treatment and once again went the distance and returned the following fall to resume her duties. "In August I'll be cancer free for five years," she says victoriously.

As Susan's career comes to an end, what is she looking forward most to in retirement? "I'm anxious to get to know myself again. I'm looking forward to doing nothing for a while."
