#### Criteria for Nominations -

All nominees must have conducted themselves in such manner to reflect honor upon Dieruff High School and have qualities of character and standards of conduct that are exemplary.

Additional clarification for nomination criteria is as follows:

- 1. Honor is reserved for DHS graduates. Individuals that have distinguished themselves through superb accomplishment on a local, state or national level of prominence.
- 2. This award recognizes accomplishments in diverse fields of endeavor. The following categories for consideration are:

Arts \* Business \* Education \*Entertainment / TV / Film

Finance / Economic Development \* Government \*Historians

Law / Criminal Justice \* Media / Journalism / Writing

Medicine / Health / Science \*Military

- 3. Graduates are not eligible until more than five years have elapsed from graduation.
- 4. Recognition can be awarded to posthumous nominees.

Non-Dieruff graduates may be considered for an "honorary" status in the Dieruff Alumni Wall of Distinction.

**Nomination Process** – We welcome all community members' nominations. Nominations must be in writing, and submitted on the official Nomination Form. It took Andre Reed no time at all to connect with the people who had assembled in the Media Center at Dieruff High School on February 21st to welcome the NFL Hall of Famer back to his alma mater. As soon as he arrived, he began "working the room" with the warmth of an accomplished diplomat.

After greeting Principal Sue Bocian, Superintendent Thomas Parker, several members of the AFROTC staff, and dignitaries from Kutztown University (his college alma mater), Andre methodically engaged each of the 50 Dieruff students who had been selected to attend this special event.

No one in the room was prouder to experience the reunion than Mrs. Joyce Reed-Ebling, Andre's mother. Attired in a sporty Buffalo Bills blouse, Joyce beamed as she watched her son pay tribute to Dieruff and bask in the adoration.

The event was organized by the NFL

Hall of Fame, and is entitled "Heart of In response to a question about his the Hall of Fame". The program is designed to bring those elite gold jacket recipients closer to the kids. Without hesitation, Andre agreed to participate in the impressive video conference program, and suggested that he make his contribution from Dieruff High School.

Positioned at the podium in the front of the room, Andre was flanked by two large video screens. The laptop computer on the podium was connected for the video conference, with a moderator located at the Hall of Fame Headquarters in Canton, Ohio. Several high schools in other parts of the country were also linked in to the conference for the question and answer program.

Fielding diverse questions, Andre provided candid and positive responses. One repetitive theme was his advice to maintain a clear vision or goal, work hard, and never give up.

current life (after dedicating 30 years to the game of football), he shared the fact that a great deal of his focus is on working with the kids. Annually, Reed hosts a celebrity golf tournament at the Lehigh Country Club that has raised over \$300,000 for the Allentown Boys and Girls Club. He is also active in a reading initiative program entitled "Read with Reed 83", which encourages kids to read at least 30 minutes each day.

#### Dieruff "Sew What?" Club Cited at City Hall

The spacious chambers of the Allentown City Council were packed with a standing-room-only crowd on Friday evening, February 28th as Mayor Ray O'Connell recognized honorees of the 2019 "Catch a Young Person Doing Something Right" campaign.

Launched seven years ago, the campaign is designed to honor young people who contribute to the well-being of Allentown. Proudly, eight members of the Dieruff High School after-school sewing group, known as the "Sew What?" Club, received certificates signed by the Mayor, and also by State Representatives Peter Schweyer and Mike Schlossberg. These students won their award in the category of "Volunteerism".

Being intrinsically motivated, the young people in the club don't need accolades to inspire their volunteerism. That's not to say that they don't appreciate hearing that they are making a difference.

During the year, the students have enjoyed receiving thank you notes from the hospital patients who are using the mastectomy pillows or the drain holders made by the club. The video illustrating the dramatic impact that the "fidgety finger blankets" had on the Alzheimer patients had a profound affect on the club members. The complimentary note and certificate signed by the Executive Director of the Ronald McDonald House after receiving the children's pillow cases was certainly appreciated. And the image of a Pennsylvania Army Private stationed in a distant land opening his Holiday gift as part of the

"Stockings For Soldiers" campaign sincerely touched their hearts.

And now, this significant honor bestowed by the Mayor on behalf of the City of Allentown culminates another year of very impressive volunteerism and community service.

Sponsored by the Dieruff Alumni Association, the "Sew What" Club meets weekly, and is organized by 1961 alumnae Ruth O'Connell and Jinny Bankhard Hughes. We commend Ruth and Jinny for donating their time and talent, and for helping to inspire these dedicated young students.

So what occupies that space now? The alcove adjacent to the main entrance lobby hosts an original bronze sculpture created by the highly acclaimed sculptor Harry Ber-


toia. This impressive piece, secured behind a clear protective shield, was a gift from the Dieruff Class of 1964.


