"Disciple of Discipline". That is term that a Morning Call sports writer affectionately used to describe a Dieruff High School basketball coach, after he had suspended two star players and tossed a third player off the team. The year was 1978. The coach was Mr. Terry German.


The fact is that Coach German did not initiate those punitive actions. He simply made sure the consequences were carried out. The rules had been defined explicitly. The desired behavior was quite clear. The consequence of noncompliance was never in doubt. It was a simple matter of cause and effect. Behavior produces consequences. The word discipline comes from disciple. The goal is not to punish; the goal is to teach. Lesson learned!

Coach German was tough, but he was fair. And he cared about his kids. For eight seasons (1974 – 1981), Terry German served as head basketball coach at Dieruff, and earned the respect of his play-

ers, and the entire basketball community. His teams won competitive championships. Mr. German personally earned his share of trophies and plaques. His players developed their basketball talents, and life skills as well.

On January 30, 2016, players, cheerleaders, and colleagues will gather at the Dieruff vs. Allen basketball game to celebrate "*The Terry German Years*", with a followup reunion scheduled at the Brass Rail.

Three and a half decades after Coach German touched the minds. hearts, and souls of Husky ball players, our Dieruff High School is blessed to boast a cadre of likeminded coaches, determined to build character as well as successful athletes. These coaches have established clear rules, defined expectations, and promised serious consequences for noncompliance. Inevitably, there will always be kids that will test the system. As a result, we have seen a talented quarterback sidelined for missing practice, a skilled soccer goalie thrown off the squad for a flagrant



violation of rules, and a Division 1 basketball candidate dismissed for frequent behavior issues.

We salute these coaches for embracing their integrity, holding true to their values, and teaching important life's lessons.

Ruth E. O'Connell had been selected to receive this award by the Midway Manor Community Association, and the officers chose their year-end December 7th meeting to make the presentation. Dick Wilburn, President of the Allentown east-side community association developed a plan to surprise Ruth, and also to have my wife, Jinny, and me at the presentation. Ruth and I are cousins, and the three of us are proud members of the Dieruff Class of 1961. We are also active in the Dieruff Alumni Association.

Dick told Ruth that he wanted to have all three of us on the meeting agenda. Ruth and Jinny would make a presentation on the "Sew What?" Club, the after-school sewing club sponsored by the Alumni Association, and founded by Ruth and Jinny. I would then present an overview of the Alumni Association.

A long-time resident of Midway Manor, Ruth lives in the home her parents owned for decades. She takes immense pride in the simple, two-story white brick house, handsomely set on a corner lot. The yard is graced with a number of towering trees and manicured bushes and flowers. Several years ago, the City of Allentown recognized Ruth with a Property of Merit People's Choice Award. Totally in character, she accepted the honor with dignity and honor.

Club had completed. She explained that the club selects projects based on their community service value. Ruth and Jinny then showed the audience each project. The mastectomy pillows are an on-going project and are donated to Muhlenberg Hospital. The large heart-shaped pillows are also delivered to that medical facility, and are given to cardiac patients. The colorful cat beds were delivered to a rescue facility in Nazareth.

The stuffed teddy bear project received a special round of applause. At the time, the story had received coverage by Channel 69 WFMZ. Acting Police Chief Joe Hanna (now, newly elected Sherriff of Lehigh County) had been invited to the Sew What classroom to accept a donation of 45 teddy bears for distribution to police officers, to be carried in their patrol cars, and used to comfort a child in distress. Joe Hanna, a 1974 Dieruff Alum, had also been one of Ruth's students when he was in Ritter Elementary School. (Ruth retired after 30 years of teaching in the Allentown School District.)

The most recent of the projects completed by the club was the Christmas stockings, sewn and delivered to the "Stockings For Soldiers" program. At the conclusion of Ruth's presentation, she passed around an album containing photos of the student members of the club, the projects, and a host of thank you letters. Not only are Ruth and Jinny teaching these young people a valuable skill, they are also serv-

ing as powerful mentors and role models.

Next on the agenda, I described how the Dieruff Alumni Association had been founded four years ago, with the expressed mission of promoting Husky Pride among alumni, current students, faculty and staff, and the community. Ruth E. O'Connell has played a vital role in our association since it's inception. Not only has she organized and conducted the weekly "Sew What?" Club meetings, she has served as official lifeguard at our annual swim party for the Dieruff Football Team. Ruth's most recent contribution occurred last weekend when she joined a group of Alumni Choir members for a Christmas Caroling visit to two local senior living facilities.

Following my address, Dick Wilburn invited Ruth to join us at the front of the meeting room, where she was presented with a handsome plaque, suitably engraved with her name and the designation "Citizen of the Year" for 2015. Obviously surprised, and pleased, she remained dignified and humble.

Ruth's lifestyle represents an enviable model for all of us. Her hobbies and interests include walking, hiking, bird watching, kayaking, gardening, quilting, and swimming. She thinks nothing of driving up to Maine to do some ocean kayaking, paddling into coves to observe feathered wildlife up close and personal. She belongs to several quilt guilds where they work on challenging projects. Her passion for swimming translates into daily visits to the Allentown "Y" where she routinely completes a one-mile swim and aerobics.


#### Saturday, March 5th 2016 7pm Live at World Renowned Carnegie Hall, New York City, NY

Make them for your favorite dog or for friends with dogs....

#### Peanut Butter Pumpkin dog treats

2 1/2 cups whole wheat flour

2 eggs

1/2 cup canned pumpkin

2 or 3 tablespoons of peanut butter

1/2 tsp. cinnamon

a bit of water just to make a stiff dough.

Mix all ingredients, adding water if needed. Dough will be stiff. Roll to a half inch thick. Easy to roll. Use cookie cutters for a festive look. Bake at 350 for 40 minutes until hard. Since there are no preservatives, shelf life is like cookies. Or you can freeze them.

On November 19, 2015, a unique and uplifting event took place at the Dick Schmidt Gymnasium at Dieruff High School. It was a Thursday night and basketball was on the schedule. But what made this basketball game different from any other game were the participants. The Dieruff Boys Basketball team was hosting the Allentown Police Department in an event which would attempt to bridge the gap between the two groups.

Envisioned by Coach Joe Jarjous as a way to foster a positive relationship between young men and the APD, this game did more than entertain. Given the recent events which had occurred in the Lehigh Valley, there was a need to see that there were positive events taking place between young people and those in authority. Although this game was scheduled prior to the incidents, the timing could not have been better. It served as a catalyst for unity and cooperation between the two groups. Even more unique was the idea that rather than opposing each other on the court, members from both groups exchanged uniforms and merged into two teams consisting of both Dieruff & APD players, symbolizing the emphasis on unity and respect.
