FLASHBACK: The Bare Facts in the Natatorium

In the buff! Sans bathing suit! Skinny dipping in the Dieruff Swimming Pool!

That's right! For the first several years at DHS, the boys had to swim naked in the pool during gym class. No one could ever explain the reason for the procedure, but that's the way it was. It certainly resulted in "social distancing" before we ever heard the term.


In contrast, the girls were issued not so attractive tank suits for their swimming pool gym classes.

Mr. Dennis McGinley was the swim coach and swimming instructor, and he often began his class with the phrase, "Swimming is Fun". Sorry, Mr. McGinley. This was not my idea of fun.

The beautiful Olympic sized pool was home for the Dieruff Boys Swim Team... and that included diving. With a depth of 10 1/2 feet, the pool is too shallow to permit diving today. There









was no Girls Swim Team; however, the girls did form a swim club known as the Aqua-Dierettes, and they performed synchronized swim routines before the meets.

In 1961, swim star Rick Hollister, in his junior year, became Dieruff High School's first State Champion, earning a gold medal in the 50 yard freestyle event. His time of 22.3 seconds broke the existing state record, and was half a second off the national mark. The following year, Rick shaved a tenth of a second off his time, establishing a new mark of 22.2 seconds, and winning his second gold medal. Now, almost 60 years later, his record time remains unbeaten on the Dieruff Record Board.

Taking advantage of the impressive resource, now named the "Dennis A. McGinley Natatorium", the seniors annually held their "Senor Splash" Party. Some of the activities were races, diving for chips, umbrella races, and the three-handed race. Senior Class Advisor, Mr. Thomas Persing, and his wife, Mardi, were chaperones for the popular event. From all accounts, participants agreed with Mr. McGinley's adage: "Swimming is Fun"!

Louis E. Dieruff High School Alumni Wall of Distinction William F. Gilly, PhD '68

Our introduction to the next 2020 Wall of Distinction honoree takes us to the rich ocean waters of Monterey Bay where we find the renowned marine biologist, Dr. William Gilly. Dr. Gilly and his work are based at the Hopkins Marine Station of Stanford University in Pacific Grove, California. A Professor of Biology, his research at the Gilly Lab focuses on the behavior, physiology, and ecology of the Humboldt, or jumbo,





squid. He is considered to be the world's top expert on squid behavior.

The author of numerous peer-reviewed publications, Dr. Gilly served as one of the highly acclaimed scientists involved in the documentary television miniseries, "The Future is Wild." An avid fan and frequent lecturer on American novelist John Steinbeck, he served in 2004 as the Director and Chief Scientist of the Sea of Cortez Exploration and Education Project. Today, Dr. Gilly also directs the outreach program *Squids4Kids* which provides free science education materials to K-12 classrooms on the huge, mysterious Humboldt squid.

From Mosser Elementary School in Allentown to his post-doctoral studies at two Ivy League universities, this '68 Husky, referred to simply as "Gilly" by his Dieruff classmates and by his Stanford faculty colleagues, has always been known for his spirit of outdoor adventure. When he and his childhood buddies get together every Friday evening for their weekly Zoom Happy Hour, they often recall stories of nighttime fishing trips, overnight canoe trips on the Delaware River, and dressing up in costumes to go to the Allentown Fair. And, where does "Gilly" want to visit every time he's back in town? Stahley's, of course!

The LED Alumni Association is proud to salute Dr. William Gilly who was so moved by his selection to the Dieruff Wall of Distinction that he titled his sincerely-written Thank You reply, "Husky Humility and Pride." That says it all.
