"Hope" seems to be the operative word for 2021. Indeed, if all goes well, we will be able to celebrate our *Fandangle* at the end of July.


And so, on behalf of the Dieruff Alumni Association, I would like to extend our best wishes for a year filled with *Hope*, *Health*, *and Happiness*.



Arlotto Campaign to Raise Funds For Theatre Lighting



Jay Radio Treated to Wall of Distinction Induction "Preview"

The Dieruff Alumni Association has long enjoyed a special relationship with John "Jay" Radio, Class of '67. For many years, the association has conducted two of its popular social events - the Mardi Gras Party and the Fandangle Mega-Reunion - at the East Side Youth Center in Allentown. Jay Radio has served as the Activities Director of the ESYC, and has always worked diligently to ensure the success of our events.

Jay is one of the five people chosen for the Alumni Wall of Distinction, Class of 2020. He has contributed greatly to the mission of the East Side Youth Center for over four decades, including spearheading a capital improvement campaign that raised \$1.75 million dollars. The ESYC even honored Jay by inscribing his name in the floor of their new gymnasium.

Unfortunately, our plans to hold the Wall of Distinction induction ceremony for the Class of 2020 have been frozen due to the pandemic. We thought it might be entertaining to provide Jay, along with some of his family and friends, with a brief preview of his portion of the induction ceremony.



On the Saturday before Christmas, we met Jay and his wife, Nancy, at the ESYC, under the guise of taking some photos. One of the couple's three sons, Mark, along with his wife and four children had been visiting from their home in Westchester, PA, and they were able to join us. The president of the ESYC, Joey D'Annibale, was also there.

Donning their protective masks, the group sat on bleachers in the main gym, as they listened to a presentation by John Hughes, who described the "backstory" of the Wall of Distinction. Instituted 2 years ago, the *Wall of Distinction* is designed to complement, not compete with, the school's *Wall of Fame* that recognizes Dieruff Huskies for their athletic achievements. John explained how six people were chosen for the inaugural year of 2019, marking the 60th anniversary of the school. He then gave a brief profile of each of those six, emphasizing that the bar for selection had been set extremely high. The plan is to add five additional recipients each year. John then profiled each of the Huskies selected for the Class of 2020, reinforcing the fact that the process continues to be extremely selective.

As John finally reached the fifth name in the alphabetically listed Class of 2020, he dramatically pointed to Mr. John "Jay" Radio. Tongue in cheek, John mentioned that many of the other recipients boasted impressive letters following their names (Ph.D., D.O., DMA, and MSgt.). Our honored guest bears only one letter, positioned in the middle of his name, and that is "J".

John proceeded to outline the outstanding achievements of Jay Radio. He noted that Jay's efforts through those 40-plus years touched the lives of more Little Huskies and Dieruff Huskies than all of the other recipients combined. Jay has truly made a difference.



After the presentation, members of the small yet highly attentive audience removed their masks and posed for photos. Each person seemed to have gained an increased level of appreciation for Jay Radio. Even Joey D'Annibale asked if he obtain a copy of Jay's Wall of Distinction plaque, so that the award could be displayed at the East Side Youth Center. Another tribute to Jay Radio!

Alumni Wall of Distinction... a Distinct Honor

FLASHBACK: Quirky QWERTY Keyboards in Typing Class

How poetic! Years ago, an oft heard lament in the typing class at Dieruff was, "when it comes to typing, I'm all thumbs!" Well, here we are decades later, and you can observe today's kids, typing with great proficiency on their cellphones. They're "all thumbs", indeed!

Typing classes during those early years were considered vital, providing critical training to all the students. A cadre of dedicated teachers offered quality typing instruction, as well as fascinating historical information.



It was not uncommon for the first day of typing class to overflow with comical questions and surprising trivia. At least one student in the class would claim to have a "defective" typewriter, void of all of the keytops. We would soon discover that all of those Underwood and Royal Manual Typewriters had blank keytops. This approach required us to memorize the keyboard, facilitating "touch typing".

The next "surprise" launched upon us was the "jumbled" configuration of the keys. The large chart at the front of the classroom identified the QWERTY keyboard, getting its name from the arrangement of keys on the upper left section of keys, above the "home row".




An inquisitive student would always ask why the keyboard was not designed applying a simple alphabetical sequence. We learned that the man who received the patent for the typewriter on June 23, 1868 was Christopher Latham Sholes. He originally tried the alphabetical layout in his early prototypes.

He discovered that, as the typist attained a rapid speed, the type bars would collide and jam. Wisely, he rearranged the keyboard so the most commonly used letters were shifted to be more difficult to reach. So the QWERTY layout was actually designed to slow down or impede the typing process, avoiding the jamming of the type bars on the early models.

As years went by, the old manual typewriters were replaced by electric typewriters, including the IBM Selectric with the "ball" or typing element. With these newer models, there was no need to slow down the typing process.



Along came a man by the name

of August Dvorak. After exhaustive time and motion studies, he introduced what he not-so-modestly called the "*Dvorak Keyboard*". He placed the most frequently used letters directly under the home row, allowing the typist to type more quickly and with less fatigue. Studies showed that the keyboard increased accuracy and speed by about 70%. The result: the keyboard never caught on. The QWERTY keyboard had become entrenched; people resist change.

Even now, 150 years after its initial introduction, the QWERTY keyboard appears on computers, laptops, ipads, and smart phones. Admittedly, I still use my stylus to strike the tiny keyboard on my smart phone, rather than convert to the double thumb method. Thumbs? Just not my type.
