
President's Message Kay Kurtz '74

Alumni Profiles: Wall of Distinction 2019 Inductees: Dr. Kirk A. Shinsky '70 and Dr. John Stevens '63

The final two Huskies who were honored in our inaugural group hail from the Classes of 1970 and 1963. Representing the fields of Science and Medicine, respectively, the notable achievements of Dr. Kirk A. Shinsky '70 and Dr. John S. Stevens '63 undeniably set the bar high for our recognition of distinguished alumni.

A local hero in 1970 who put LED on the map, Kirk Shinsky was the Pride of the East Side when he won the Westinghouse National Science Talent Search, rising above other students who represented the top schools in the country. These photographs, kindly shared by his brother Kevin, were taken at the former ABE Airport upon Kirk's arrival from the competition to a jubilant crowd celebrating his national recognition. (Notice Kiska I in the foreground.)

Kirk continued his academic excellence at the prestigious Ivy League schools of Cornell and Princeton Universities, graduating cum laude in 1974 and going on to earn his Ph. D. in 1978. He fulfilled his dream of becoming a professor when he was appointed to the Physics Department at the University of California at Berkeley. He also served on the Lawrence Berkeley Laboratory scientific staff and was responsible for the upgrading of the Advanced Undergraduate Laboratory course in the Physics Department. With a hands-on approach to Physics, Kirk enjoyed challenges, devising solutions to technical problems, and interacting with his students.

Sadly, Kirk succumbed to cancer at the young age of 31. It was an honor, indeed, to present the Distinguished Alumnus Award to his family at our June Dedication. The last 2019 inductee on our Wall of Distinction is Dr. John Stevens '63. A local physician, Dr. Stevens takes every opportunity to share Husky Pride with his colleagues and patients while making time in his busy schedule to participate in our many alumni events. In addition to his professional, clinical, and volunteer activities, Dr. Stevens is a proud supporter of our students in the Allentown School District.

Raised in a family which taught the importance of serving others, young

John grew up with a strong work ethic at Second and Tilghman Streets. He is a proud graduate of both Temple University and the Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine, earning his DO degree in 1973. He then completed his internship and residency programs at the Allentown Osteopathic Medical Center in 1978. Today, forty-one years later, he practices obstetrics/gynecology for St. Luke's University Health Network and caringly treats his patients as individuals, acknowledging them for allowing him to serve them. He also has been a Clinical Instructor for Ob/Gyn surgery for PCOM, and has been an Associate Clinical Professor at DeSales University.

A most humble and gracious gentleman, Dr. Stevens has selflessly lived by his motto of serving God first, then his family and patients. My favorite story of Dr. Stevens is that his very first delivery (over the telephone !) was of a litter of Husky puppies. How appropriate ! 
