Roy's contribution to the Theatre Department was particularly dramatic. As Advisor for the Stage Crew, he designed and helped build sets; he also coordinated the lighting and sound for many of

Dieruff High School's theatrical productions.

In recent times, the theatre lighting for the musicals at Dieruff has been rented, at a very substantial cost, from a

theatre production company. It is quite appropriate that our Alumni Association has decided to launch a fund raising campaign to purchase a package of "state of the art" Theatre Lighting, in the name of Mr. Roy Arlotto.

#### **Husky Gridders Grind The Canaries**

Any athletic victory over our cross-town rival is sure to evoke cheers of delight from the faithful Husky Nation. On October 31, 2020, the gridiron triumph at J.Birney Crum Stadium was particularly sweet.

For one thing, the COVID-19 pandemic played havoc on this year's football schedule. Not only was the season postponed until October, the teams on our original schedule were replaced with the five high schools in our county, four of which are football powerhouses. That translated into lopsided losses to Whitehall, Emmaus, Parkland, and Allentown Central Catholic. William Allen High School experienced similar losses to those schools. That situation precipitated a showdown between the Huskies and the Canaries, both teams hungry for a victory.

Restrictions established for the virus protocol translated into a sadly diminished crowd, with virtually no students or alumni in attendance. Those lucky fans who were fortunate enough to obtain game tickets were required to wear protective masks and remain socially distant. With cheerleaders, AFJROTC cadets, and coaches also donning face coverings, it seemed poetic that the event occurred on Halloween.

Escorted by Principal Mike Makhoul, our valiant mascot Kiska V lead the players onto the field. It was an electric moment, and it seemed to energize the group. On their initial possession, Dieruff moved down the field swiftly, and scored a touchdown, establishing a positive momentum. The final score of 25-12 does not reflect the absolute dominance the Huskies maintained throughout the contest.

The traditional trophies were awarded at the conclusion of the game; Dieruff came home with the hardearned hardware. With their helmets raised a bit higher than usual, and big hugs and smiles exchanged, the Huskies celebrated with unbridled joy. We offer our hearty congratulations to Coach Lutte, his staff, and the entire Husky Football Team.



#### President's Message: Veterans Day 101

The holiday was originally called Armistice Day to commemorate the end of World War I, an armistice on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. For that reason, Nov. 11, 1918, was largely considered the end of "the war to end all wars" and dubbed Armistice Day.

In 1938, it became an official holiday, primarily a day set aside to honor veterans of World War I. But then World War II and the Korean War happened, so on June 1, 1954, at the urging of veterans service organizations, Congress amended the commemoration yet again by changing the word "armistice" to "veterans" so the day would honor American veterans of all wars.

A lot of Americans get confused as to the difference between Memorial Day and Veterans Day. **Veterans Day is NOT the Same as Memorial Day.** Memorial Day is a

time to remember those who gave their lives for our country, particularly in battle or from wounds they suffered in battle. Veterans Day honors all of those who have served the country in war or peace — dead or alive — although it's largely intended to thank living veterans for their sacrifices.

PA National Guard – 13 Classmates


Please continue to forward updates on fellow classmates that you know who have served in the military and their profile is not updated. It's easy to tell – just follow these instructions:

With impressive credentials that spanned such a wide variety of interests at Husky High, Mr. Roy Arlotto was probably unaware of his role as a "Matchmaker".





In 1969, Roy's attention was laser focused on designing and building the set for the Theatre Department's challenging performance of "The Music Man". As Advisor for the Stage Crew, he managed a sizeable group of enthusiastic students. One of those crew members was a senior by the name of **Glenn Strobl**.

Diligently rehearsing in close proximity to Mr. Arlotto's crew was the large cast of the popular musical. Dedicated singers and dancers worked in harmony, under the direction of Mr. Bernie Schimmel and Mr. Peter Carpenter. Among the talented cast members was another senior named Laura Voyden.

Poetically, Glenn and Laura met and became a "thing". After Dieruff graduation, they both went off to Penn State and later married. They warmly attribute their magical connection to Mr. Roy Arlotto. Yearly, they exchanged Christmas cards with Mr. "A". Roy's card was always signed, "Still Kickin". From their home in Spring, TX, Glenn and Laura send their heartfelt condolences to the family of Mr. Roy Arlotto, their personal "Matchmaker".





### Louis E. Dieruff High School Alumni Wall of Distinction John J. "Jay" Radio, '67



A gentle giant of a man with a warm, winning smile, our final Wall of Distinction inductee for 2020 is John "Jay" Radio from the Class of 1967. As coach, mentor, organizer, and fundraiser, he has devoted decades to promoting youth sports for thousands of youngsters in the Lehigh Valley.

Jay's selfless contributions to the local sports community have included the East Side Youth Center basketball program, the LV Knee-High Basketball League, Dieruff Varsity Basketball, the Pennsylvania Keystone State Games, along with the summertime

Stellar "Catch a Rising Star" and Sports Fest Basketball Tournaments. Jay was also the co-founder of the first boys' Lehigh Valley AAU Basketball Club and, in 2010, he was inducted into the inaugural class of the LV Recreational Sports Hall of Fame.

In addition to his life-long commitment to youth athletics, Jay is the Financial Secretary of the East Side Youth Center and the Chairman of its Board of Governors. He also writes all of the grant requests to charitable foundations, corporations, and government agencies. He is especially proud of the \$1.75 million capital improvement campaign which provided for a second gymnasium, a learning center, fitness and community rooms (which support many adult programs), and the upgrade of all building and safety features. On the beautiful new gymnasium floor which fittingly bears Jay's name, neighborhood kids can play a game of pick-up basketball under the spirited display of Kiska pennants. The number of Little Huskies who have benefited from the activities offered by the ESYC is countless, and Jay Radio has played a vital role in its mission for more than forty years.

The Louis E. Dieruff High School Alumni Association is proud to salute John "Jay" Radio '67 for his decades of service to Lehigh Valley youth sports programs. A hardworking man of humble generosity, his character is best summed up by a life-long friend who had submitted his Wall of Distinction nomination with these heart-felt words, "Jay Radio is an outstanding man with an unwavering dedication who has willingly and tirelessly supported his community. He is more than qualified for this great honor for his many accomplishments on and off the basketball court."


